As we begin a new year at the Foundation, we prepare for one of the largest travel schedules in many years.

Over 50 hospital visits will be conducted including 20 site surveys, over 30 registry visits and several educational/consultative visits. Our

Pennsylvania trauma center map has more locations than ever—30 accredited trauma centers.

Beyond those 30 trauma centers, four more hospitals are pursuing level three accreditation and one hospital is pursuing level two accreditation. As PTSF looks to the future we will focus on our new vision statement:

A Tribute to Dr. John Pryor

The following article comes to you from the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania. We dedicate this newsletter to Dr. Pryor's memory as we reflect on his life from those who knew him best . . .

The University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine expresses our sincere thanks for the outpouring of support received since the announcement of John P. Pryor's death on Christmas Day. We have been overwhelmed with communications from around the world with wishes of condolences, prayers, and offers of support for our HUP colleagues and for the Pryor family.

John Paul Pryor was the Trauma Program Medical Director for the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania and was serving his second tour of duty with a forward surgical team as a com-



bat surgeon with the United States Army when he was killed by enemy fire in Iraq. John (42) of Moorestown, NJ leaves behind, his beloved wife Carmella and 3 children (Danielle 10, Frankie 8, John-John 4). John came to the University of Pennsylvania in 1999 after completing his surgical training at the State University of New York in Buffalo.

After completing his Fellowship in Trauma Surgery and Critical Care, he joined the HUP faculty. John or "JP" as many of us referred to him was a "magical man, with boundless energy and goodness. He was an

“The Pennsylvania Trauma Systems Foundation will become the premier organization in Pennsylvania to assure optimal outcomes of all injured patients.”

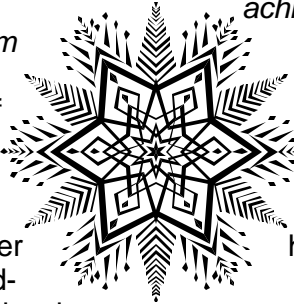
The key word is all patients.

outstanding physician, gifted surgeon, teacher, and mentor. At his core were many great values, but his passion for service to others was his greatest. He gave back something to each and everyone of us, everyday. His favorite quote by Albert Schweitzer remains in his office and it captures the essence of John Pryor.

“... Seek always to do some good, somewhere. Every man has to seek his own in his own way to realize his true worth. You must give some time to your fellow man. Even if it’s a little thing, do something for those who need your help, something for which you get no pay but the privilege of doing it. For remember, you don’t live in a world all your own. Your brothers are here, too.”

John was an eloquent speaker and writer who contributed to the literature and media. He wrote an

op-ed for *The Washington Post* about “The War in West Philadelphia.” He wrote, “In Iraq, I found myself drawing on my experience as a civilian trauma surgeon each time mascals (mass casualties)

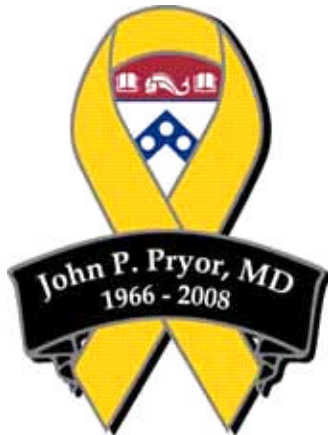
would overrun the combat hospital... The wounds and nationalities of the patients are different, but the feelings of helplessness, despair and loss are the same. In Iraq, soldiers die for freedom, for

honor, for their country and for their buddies. Here in Philadelphia, they die without honor, without purpose, for no country, for no one.”

John absolutely adored his wife and his three children. During conversations concerning family, John’s smile was infectious and

you always knew how proud he was of each of them. John’s life outside of the hospital with his family might include tossing the football, jam sessions in the basement on his guitar with the kids banging the drums, and of course many a night post call John could be found on his bed surrounded by the kids horse-playing and eating pizza.

JP has affected many lives and for many of us he truly exemplifies the meaning of the word “hero.” The World has suffered a great loss with John’s early passing. John Pryor will always have a place in our hearts. May we all carry on his mission and dedication of caring for the injured and may we never forget the man who has taught us so much.

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Electronic Application for Site Survey— *E-AFS 2010*

In order to more fully beta-test the electronic application for survey (E-AFS) before mandatory use by all surveyed trauma centers, the Board of Directors approved the use of a paper AFS for the 2009 survey season.

A memo describing the details of this decision was sent to all trauma coordinators on December 4, 2008. The “paper” AFS was disseminated to all surveyed

trauma coordinators electronically by Paige Jordan and will be due by February 6, 2009 for hospitals applying for level one and two trauma center accreditation and by February 20, 2009 for those hospitals applying for level three accreditation.

Paige Jordan will be convening an E-AFS workgroup comprised of volunteers from the original beta test group to continue with

beta testing and finalization of the E-AFS, which will be used for the 2010 site survey season.

E-AFS development plans for 2009 include continued work with Digital Innovations, Inc. to integrate the physician credentialing database into the E-AFS for use beginning in 2010.

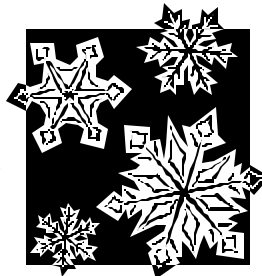
Board Approves “Mock” Site Survey Preparation Education

According to the PTSF “New Trauma Center Policy” (AC-130), for hospitals pursuing accreditation, PTSF mandates a consultative visit the year prior to the formal site survey.

In order to meet criteria for this visit processes such as surgeon call schedules, triage activation criteria and a comprehensive performance improvement (PI) process must be in place. Another important component is proper staffing including a trauma coordinator and trauma program medical director.

During the last several years we have encountered hospitals pursuing level three accreditation that do not have this in place. In order to continue to provide supportive education the Board of Directors approved that starting in 2009; PTSF will be able to provide mock survey services to hospitals pursuing accreditation as well as mature trauma centers. Survey teams will be developed by Foundation staff as is done with a formal survey. PTSF staff will accompany the survey team and

the format of the day will be similar. The difference, however, will be that the survey team will focus less on medical record review and more on educational opportunities throughout the day.



A report will also be developed by Foundation staff as is done during both the consultative visit and formal survey. The cost of the service will remain the same. Questions regarding this new process should be directed to Paige Jordan.

ATTENTION: Credentialing Database Update

Trauma centers no longer need to submit copies of the credentialing databases for physicians, nurses and social workers.

The educational components of the standards (Standards, VI, VII, X and XXX1) will now be part of your trauma center's site survey process.

This new process is for all trauma center levels—consultative visits, new applications and "mature" trauma centers. The review will start with those trauma centers being surveyed in 2009.

With the next phase of the electronic application for survey (E-AFS), the physician database will be incorporated as part of the software. Nurse and social worker education will need to be

maintained by the trauma center.

As was noted in the winter edition (2007-2008) of the "Foundation News," trauma centers no longer need to use the Foundation's database to track education and CME. In-house systems that monitor compliance can be utilized. On site survey day, Foundation staff will ask for several employee files—chosen at random—to show overall compliance with physician, nursing and social work credentialing standards.

At the next meeting, the Policy & Procedure Committee will examine how the reports will be disseminated to the trauma centers—whether that will be in a separate report or incorporated into the site survey accreditation report.

Pediatric Committee Update

Committee Chairperson: Barbara Gaines, MD, Trauma Program Medical Director—Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh of UPMC

This committee has been through much change in 2008 including a title change, which will now increase the scope of how that committee functions.

Many thanks are given to Dr. Bob Cilley, Pediatric Trauma Medical Director at the Penn State Milton S. Hershey Medical Center. Dr. Cilley was instrumental in the work of the committee since 2003.

The most notable accomplishments during this time were the

revision of Standards for Trauma Center Accreditation which not only included Pediatric Centers but also Adult Centers as well.

The committee goals for 2009 and beyond are:

- To continue to provide input into the revisions of the Adult and Pediatric Standards for Trauma Center Accreditation.
- To work to be more involved in pediatric research, including the participation in a study to develop Acute Stress

Disorder Screening and Interventions in Trauma Patients.

- To develop a guideline related to Radiologic Imaging of Pediatric Patients.
- To examine pediatric registry issues in collaboration with the current Registry Committee.
- To continue examination of standards involving care of pediatric patients in adult trauma centers that care for injured children. (ATC-CIC).

Committee to Develop Site Survey Outcome Measurements

Committee Chairperson: Michael Pasquale, MD, FACS, Trauma Program Medical Director—Lehigh Valley Health Network

The "Outcomes Committee" met in November 2008 to approve several initiatives for the next three years.

In 2009, two objectives will be focused on. The first is to develop a list of "opportunities for improvement" (OFI's) for each phase of care. Once those OFI's are agreed upon, the support of Digital Innovations will be enlisted to integrate them into the 2010 Outcomes Software. Likewise, peer review language will also be incorporated into the software to

provide an additional mechanism for peer review protection. Another objective of the committee will be to examine occurrence definitions starting with the top five occurrences of pneumonia, DVT, PE, UTI and septicemia. When definitions are finalized, state-wide education will be provided.

Dr. Pasquale, committee chairperson, submitted a manuscript to the "Journal of Trauma" in December 2008 based on the Outcomes committee study con-

ducted in 2004 which examined inter-rater reliability of mortality preventability classifications. The study is titled: "Preventability Classification in Mortality Cases: A Reliability Study" by Michael D. Pasquale, MD, Antony M. Grigoris, PhD, Andrew B. Peitzman, MD and the Pennsylvania Trauma Systems Foundation (PTSF) Outcomes Committee.

The next meeting (conference call) is scheduled on March 17th at 2 p.m.

Legislative Update

HAP sponsored a conference call on January 22 to update the trauma center community about the need for grass roots advocacy efforts.

As explained by Tim Ohrum, Director, Legislative Services, the state budget is currently in a defi-

cit, which will necessitate cuts in many programs. This means NOW is the time to invite legislators to your hospitals to educate them regarding the need to maintain funding.

2009 PTOS Manual Distributed

For the first time ever, the PTOS manual was disseminated in an electronic version via a CD. Each trauma center was mailed a CD via U.S. mail prior, to the Christmas holiday. A 350-plus paged manual makes for a very large electronic file, 135 MB to be exact.

The manual's large size is why it was sent via CD and why we had some difficulty getting it posted to the website. If you are having

We will soon be posting another version of the DOH Ambulance listing with larger margins to the Registry area of our website so that when printed and punched the holes will not obscure data.

COLLECTOR V4 Installation Window

By now, all institutions should be aware of the extended Collector V4 installation window for 2009 and the steps involved.

Briefly, as a reminder, the usual Collector CVW update should be installed first. This is required so that data may be processed at the PTSF central site for 2009. Once the 2009 Collector CVW update has been installed suc-

cessfully your institution should contact Digital Innovation, Inc. (DI) to begin discussing the Collector CV4 installation.

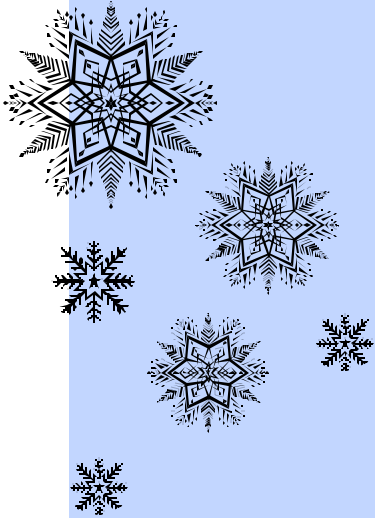
registry.
